Burnt Lands Alvar - Mississippi Mills

The unique biodiversity and sensitive wetlands of the Barbers Lake and Long Sault Creek Watershed are not the only areas under threat from the Eastern Ontario aggregate sector. Thomas Cavanagh Construction Ltd. (TCCL) has recently renewed its intention to expand its March Road Quarry onto the Burnt Lands Alvar in Mississippi Mills. Their application to enlarge the existing quarry typifies the insatiable expansion of the extractive industries into sensitive areas. The encroachment is in defiance of designations made in previous decades, identifying Ontario's Areas of Natural and Scientific Interest (ANSI). In Mississippi Mills, the sensitive area is one of Ontario's few remaining alvars.



Alvars are defined by exposed limestone or dolostone, shallow soil and patchy tree cover, so they can appear desolate to the uninformed eye. "It's a harsh environment with unusual plants you don't find elsewhere, along with an unusual suite of invertebrate species to go with those plants," says Corina Brdar, who surveyed the area in her previous role as an Ontario Parks ecologist. "It's a little hot spot of oddities that are an important part of Ontario's biodiversity."

For nearly 5 decades, John Blais has watched a steady tide of quarry expansions and new homes encroach on the Burnt Lands Alvar. Now Blais is battling the proposed expansion that would obliterate 18 hectares of the alvar to a depth of almost 40 metres. The TCCL March Rd Quarry expansion may next proceed to a hearing at the Ontario Land Tribunal.
